## **CONVENTION PROMISES SPECTACULAR ENTERTAINMENT, INFORMATIVE WORKSHOPS**

Star-studded entertainment and a renowned motivational speaker will headline the 110th Grand Aerie/57th Grand Auxiliary International Convention in Louisville, Kentucky. A variety of educational sessions are also scheduled, ranging from Website and MMS training to a Junior Order of Eagles session and Ritual and Parliamentary workshops.

The Convention will kick off on Sunday with the “Welcome to Louisville” show featuring superstar Eagle member Billy Ray Cyrus. Other performers slated include 17-year-old country music sensation Trey Hensley and Buzz Sutherland, named “Comedian of the Year” by America’s Colleges and Universities a record 16 times.

### **Joint Opening Session will Prove Patriotic, Inspirational**



Monday begins with the Joint Opening Session, featuring James Rogers singing “Where Eagles Fly,” the theme song he composed specifically for the Fraternal Order of Eagles. The song will be accented by the majestic flight of Mr. Lincoln, the magnificent eagle that serves as the FOE Aerie and Auxiliary mascot.

Leadership expert John Maxwell will keynote the session, inviting Eagle members to embark on a journey of personal growth during his two-hour leadership/motivational program. Maxwell, who has authored 50-plus books, will focus on the five levels of leadership to “develop the leader within you.”

There will be plenty of celebrating and socializing during the Grand Auxiliary Banquet Monday evening, with a performance by singing sensation Ronnie McDowell, who dazzled the world with his heartfelt tribute to Elvis Presley, “The King is Gone.” James Rogers is also on the program as part of the banquet.

### **Banquet, Luncheon will Feature Top Performers**

With several workshops offered on Tuesday, the spotlight will turn to the Mr. and Mrs. Banquet that evening with the presentation of grants to the various charities supported by specific FOE funds. Contribution totals will also be announced for the Grand Worthy President and Grand Madam President charities.

Popular Las Vegas impressionist Andre-Phillippe Gagnon will receive top billing as a banquet entertainer, awing the audience with his famous “1,000” voices. He will be joined by sequined Las Vegas performer, Wes Winters, pianist extraordinaire and Liberace tribute artist, and comedian Russ Merlin, who appeared on “The Tonight Show” and performed for the Queen of England.



The REAC Luncheon on Wednesday will feature country legend “Whispering Bill Anderson,” a top performer in the country music industry for more than 50 years. Anderson is not only a million-selling recording artist but a game show host and Grand Ol’ Opry star.

### **More Great Opportunities**

Other Convention highlights include a presentation of the Eagles Memorial Foundation family; the International God, Flag and Country Competition; the installation of the new Grand Aerie/Auxiliary Officers; and the President’s Reception.

The All-Eagle Talent Show will be held on Thursday, starring our own gifted performers. Eagle members may enter as groups or individuals in the vocal, instrumental, comedy and variety categories

“As always, the International Convention promises to be a fun and enlightening experience for everyone,” said Chuck Cunningham, Grand Secretary. “The Convention is always a great time to meet new people, renew friendships and learn more about programs and opportunities available through the Fraternal Order of Eagles.”

This year’s Convention will be held at The Galt House, which is located along Louisville’s historic riverfront. Eagle members may register for the Convention until the day the event begins.

## **“GET TO THE POINT” ENCOURAGES AERIE/AUXILIARY TEAMWORK**

Twenty-six aeries/auxiliaries qualified for prizes in the “Get to the Point” campaign, with four Aeries/Auxiliaries conducting activities in all twelve areas. “Get to the Point” offers prizes to encourage Aeries and Auxiliaries to work together to promote new programs.

Points are awarded for activities in the following three areas:

Each activity has a point value. When Aeries/Auxiliaries host a specific activity, they submit bulletins, pictures, newspaper articles, etc. detailing the activity and in return, the Grand Aerie sends a 5 point sticker to place on their poster.

“Some points are easier for Aeries and Auxiliaries to earn,” said Janet Baker, FOE program coordinator. “If, for example, the Aerie and Auxiliary already have a Junior Order of Eagles, they will automatically receive five points.”

“Get to the Point” is a year long program continuing from June 1 to May 31, with qualifying Aeries and Auxiliaries selecting the award they want to receive. The prizes awarded are listed below:

With the "Get to the Point" program already in progress for 2009, Baker encourages Aeries and Auxiliaries to get involved.

"We hope the program will grow bigger and bigger every year," Baker said. "Get to the Point provides a fun way for Aeries and Auxiliaries to reach out to their communities, grow their membership and support FOE charity functions."

Baker indicated the prizes awarded will remain the same during 2009.

I especially want to express my gratitude to my committees and committee chairmen, the Grand Aerie officers, Grand Aerie employees and the Grand Auxiliary. It has been a great privilege to work with Grand Madam President Margaret Cox this past year—we had a wonderful working relationship. I recommend that you focus on communication and foster a spirit of cooperation with your local Auxiliary because everyone benefits.*

*On behalf of Special Olympics Montana, I want to thank the Montana Fraternal Order of Eagles for their support and recent donation of \$31,313.60.*

*This donation will help Special Olympics Montana serve more children and adults with intellectual disabilities as they train for life through sports. As an athlete-centered, family-based and volunteer-driven movement, the Montana Fraternal Order of Eagles support makes a significant difference in the lives of people who are, all too often, viewed with indifference.*

*At our recent State Summer Games, 1,000 athletes from 76 teams came together to compete in eleven Olympic-type sports and celebrate their hard work and achievements. During these Games, 27 year-old Keough Duffy ran up to me with a beaming smile, gave me a big hug, looked at me with a twinkle in her eyes and said with confidence, "I feel really good about myself". When I asked why, she said, "Because everyone here treats me like I want to be."*
